

Supporting information for grant request to Hassocks Parish Council.

Karen Fentum is a Nursing Assistant who cares for local people in their homes. She's worked at St Catherine's Hospice for nine years. Here she shares her experience of community care in the current crisis;

Coronavirus hasn't changed the care and support we give, but it has changed some of the ways we work. We're still out visiting people every day. That's never altered. But we aren't travelling together in the same car to people's homes like we used to – to minimise the risk of transmitting Coronavirus to patients and their families, and to each other. It's so important to keep ourselves safe, too, so we can continue caring for the people in our community who need us. So, for every visit, we drive in two separate cars now, which means we're all doing a lot more mileage.

We've also had to adapt to wearing PPE, and families are getting more used to us wearing it now too. They know it's there to keep them safe from infection and we do everything we can to make them feel comfortable. One thing we worried about was that wearing masks would stop patients seeing our faces – and our smiles – but they can still see our eyes and know that we care.

Since the virus hit, a lot of family members have moved in with their relatives, so they didn't risk taking the virus into their relatives' home.

Families often talk to us during our visits, sharing their concerns, and we can refer them to other colleagues in the hospice for all sorts of help – medical, emotional, financial, and spiritual. We remind people that we're always available 24/7 by phone too.

The work we do also helps to ease the pressure on GPs and District Nurses. If someone needs a morphine syringe driver set up, and a District Nurse can't get there – we can do it. We know the GPs well and have a really good relationship with them. They've all got our mobile numbers and can call us when they want to check something or find out how their patient is.

Whenever we're giving care, we're also checking people's skin and moving their limbs and positions to make sure they're not getting skin damage – and we will call in other members of the team at the hospice, or other local services, to make sure people get the best possible care and support.

Sometimes, we'll go into someone's home when they've just been referred to us and find they don't have the equipment they need. We have to think quickly and often arrange for a special, adjustable bed to be brought in and other support equipment from our therapies team.

You learn to pick up and recognise what people need. Some people are so tired that having a full wash wears them out, so we freshen them up – even something as simple as that can really lift someone's mood. Other people we visit feel up to a full bed bath. We're able to give men a shave and wash people's hair with a special shampoo shower cap – people tell us it feels amazing afterwards.

We visited one family recently, where a daughter was caring for both of her poorly parents. She was absolutely exhausted. So we arranged a night sit for her so she could get a good night's rest. The change in her when we next visited was unbelievable. Getting a good night's rest can make a huge difference when you're caring for someone who is so unwell.

We try to help people in whatever ways possible. If there's a sink full of washing up or a shopping delivery has arrived at someone's home, we'll wash up or put the shopping away. We make light meals for people too – make a sandwich, or pop in a microwave meal – and cups of tea and coffee. Anything that makes life a little bit easier for local people who are going through such a difficult time.

Sometimes people don't want us to do anything other than sit and talk to them about their worries. As they become less well, people often want to have conversations with us about death and dying and we can't be afraid to have those conversations with them. We're often with people and their families when they die, so it's not uncommon for people to ask us things like 'Am I dying?', or, 'Will I die today?'. We're there for them, to guide them through, and we're always honest.

As a team, we support each other and discuss any worries we might have. I lost my Mum in a care home at the start of lockdown and, in the few weeks before, there was a man we were looking after who was waiting for a result for possible COVID-19 after coming out of hospital. If I had visited him, I wouldn't have been able to see Mum before she died. The team were really understanding, and my colleagues covered those visits, so I was able to continue to see my Mum in her care home. And, when Mum died, the team got together remotely with me, and all lit a candle and shared a glass of wine together to give me support.

That spirit keeps us all going and helps us to continue to be there for local people through the tough times. So does the support from kind people in our local community.

Thank you so much for whatever you are able to give to support us, so we can keep caring for local people who really need us during this very difficult time.

Details of membership

Our team will provide symptom control, pain management, support with independence, emotional and spiritual guidance and assistance with welfare support. We will also support the whole family by offering reassurance, specialist advice and respite from the physical and emotional demands of caring for a loved one dying at home.

We are determined not to let our community down when they need us most. We are continually reviewing and adapting our services in response to Covid-19, in order to continue to safely provide care for people facing death and loss in the most challenging circumstances.

It costs c. £2.5million to provide community care across our catchment area.

Contribution by applicant

We receive just a third of our income from the NHS, so rely upon the generosity of our supporters and the local community to raise the remaining funds required to run our end of life care services.

Details of any other funding

We apply to charitable trusts and foundations, plus parish and town councils in our area. We raise funds through our charity retail shops, including our shop in Hassocks, and engage local individuals, community groups and businesses to help raise funds.

Amount of grant requested from the Parish Council

£300

Timescale of the project

Ongoing.
Caring for people at home is an integral part of our service, with around 80% of patients receiving care within the comfort and familiar surroundings of their own homes.

Who the project will benefit

Hassocks residents facing death and dying in their own homes will get the expert care and support they need, and carers will feel supported, reassured and better able to cope with the demands of caring for their loved ones. For local people grieving the loss of a loved one, bereavement support will be available.

If the grant request is for ongoing funding rather than a single project, give details of how the grant will be used in furthering the work of the organisation.

Support from Hassocks Parish Council will help ensure we can continue to care for people facing death and loss in these uncertain times and continue to adapt our services in the complex and evolving healthcare environment.

Some examples of recent initiatives in response to Covid-19 are gentle exercise sessions via Zoom to support the wellbeing of patients at home, and the launch of a telephone buddy scheme, whereby patients and carers can sign up to receive a regular, social phone call from a friendly hospice volunteer, to help reduce the isolation caused by lockdown and shielding measures.

We are doing everything we can to continue to safely provide care for our local community. Now, more than ever, we need your support.

Supporting people in Sussex affected by crime

I am once again writing to ask, when you are able to have your next meeting, if Hassocks Parish Council would consider making a contribution towards our essential work in supporting people in Sussex who have been affected by crime. Domestic Violence, Hate Crime and Fraud have increased by approximately 30% since Covid19 lockdown.

The impact of crime

The impact of crime can be far reaching, not only to the victim but also their family, friends and the wider community. For example a Hate Crime can divide a local community and increase the fear of crime, making people feel unsafe where they live. The impact on a victim and their family can be huge affecting them financially, emotionally, physically and psychologically. Fraud crime by phone, email and dating sites is rising and causing vulnerable people to lose large sums of money and we are frequently supporting them.

Victim Support - What we do

- We offer a free and confidential service to victims of crime, their family, friends and anyone else affected.
- We support people from all communities, whatever crime they have suffered, whenever it happened, even when they have felt unable to report it to the police.
- We give information, emotional support and practical help for as long as it takes for the victim(s) to find the strength to move on with their lives.
- We operate the Young Witness Service in Sussex. Without this service many offenders would not be brought to justice because the young witnesses would not feel able to give evidence without our support.
- We have a team specialising in Fraud, as this is an increasing crime

The Benefits for Local Communities

- Our diverse volunteer workforce, live and work locally.
- The high quality of our volunteers' training and the skills with which we equip them develops your communities and has a positive local impact beyond the criminal justice system.
- With their help victims of crime in Sussex are better able to recover and move on with their lives.

How your donation could be spent


Every contribution to the work that we do can make a big difference. For example:



I would like to ask if the members of Hassocks Parish Council would consider supporting us with a grant. As a small charity, any donation is always greatly received and makes an immediate impact on our members' lives.

"I had been self-isolating for 15 years until 4Sight Vision Support came along" Brenda, 4SVS Member

Very few of us have lived through a situation of this magnitude. At this time of uncertainty our visually impaired members need our support more than ever before. **With your support we can be there, for the people of West Sussex living with sight loss, at the time when it matters most.** A donation, however great or small, will have an immediate and beneficial impact to the health and well-being of our members.

The impact of Covid-19:

The Covid-19 pandemic has caused us to shut down our 36 social/activity clubs, drop-in clinics, Support Centres and Sight Care Advisor Service in the local hospitals. Our Outreach Team can no longer offer face-to-face support or Low Vision Assessments in members' homes and other community settings.

The 1,995 visually impaired people we support, who are already very socially isolated because of sight loss, have now been facing even more severe isolation. In addition, 80% of our members are elderly and in the 'vulnerable' category at this time.

Without the support and equipment to help members manage and make best use of their remaining sight, they may find it even more challenging to undertake daily tasks, which may put them at greater risk of falls. Members may be unable to enjoy things that may otherwise occupy their time in isolation, such as reading, sewing, puzzles and games, putting them at greater risk of developing associated mental health problems, such as anxiety and depression. **Without our support this could place greater strain on an already overburdened NHS.**

How we have adapted our services in the face of adversity:

We have adapted our existing services and introduced new ones, to ensure people with sight loss can continue to access the specialist support they need to live as independently and as well as possible, as follows:

Telephone & Email Support – Members may continue to contact one of our 4 Outreach Workers for advice, information, guidance and signposting, including specific Low Vision advice to help members maximise their remaining vision and in turn maintain some independence.

Talk & Support – We have introduced this service for those people who may feel especially anxious and lonely at this time, offering them regular chats with one of our team.

Daily Living Aids – Members may still purchase a variety of daily living aids such as large button phones, talking watches and large print materials, to help them remain safe and independent in their own homes.

Accessible Technology Advice – To help members keep in touch with friends, family and the wider community, we are providing telephone support to answer any queries and questions regarding accessible technology devices (smartphones, iPads and tablets, Alexa, Amazon Echo, laptops, etc). For most of our members using these devices is unfamiliar, therefore support with this is crucial in helping them to feel connected with the outside world.

Can you help us be there for vulnerable visually impaired people at this time of crisis?

We rely solely on voluntary donations to enable us to deliver our services free of charge to members. Funds we had hoped to raise through events, from businesses and street collections has been severely impacted, putting our services at risk.

It costs just £49 to provide Outreach support to one member for a whole year. I am writing today, to ask if you would consider supporting us with a donation towards our Outreach Team, delivering front-line support to our 1,995 members at this time of crisis.

Your gift, of any size, will enable us to:

- Be there for our members with specialist Low Vision advice to help them make best use of their remaining sight.
- Advise on, and coordinate, delivery of specialist pieces of equipment to maintain independence.
- Be a listening ear and source of support to ensure members do not feel isolated and alone.
- Keep members informed of developments via communication methods accessible to them e.g. Large Print, Audio or Braille.

We plan to establish a repair cafe on market day in Hassocks in the United Reformed Church. At repair cafés people can get broken household items repaired for free by skilled volunteers, including clothes, household electrics, technology, woodwork, children's toys and furniture. The idea is not to compete with local businesses or professionals, but to fill the gaps where these don't exist, or where the cost of repairs is more than replacing the item. Repair cafes are a way for our communities to help each other move away from our throwaway culture. We need to cover start-up costs to get the repair café set up, after which donations will make it sustainable.
